

The Fellowship Forum was founded in December, 1950, by Paul E. Stinchfield and J. Graeff Kennedy, two friends who invited others to join them in creating a group whose purposes were simply to enjoy each other's company at a weekly luncheon and to benefit from discussion of matters of general interest.

As the size of the group increased, a more formal organization was needed: basic policies were formulated and membership limited in number. This led to the adoption in 1957 of a set of Rules and Regulations, which were subsequently amended in May, 1974, in May, 1979, in September, 1981, and in September, 1982. The Forum now functions under the policies as amended in 1982, and in 1983 when the name of the policies was changed to By-Laws. In June 1987, the Fellowship Forum was incorporated in the state of California under article 23701G as a domestic non-profit corporation.

Active membership is limited to fifty-five. Officers are elected by the membership at large and serve a one-year term.

At the weekly luncheon meetings, subjects of a broad range of interests are presented by members or guest speakers, as the Record of Programs indicates each year. Partisan politics and denominational religion are prohibited subjects.

Members or guest speakers addressing the Forum are otherwise unrestricted in the expression of their views. With the speaker's consent, a short period at the end of each program is customarily devoted to questions or comments from the Forum members.

Guests of members are always welcome, except at meetings restricted to the discussion of Forum affairs.

In June 1987, the Fellowship Forum was incorporated in the State of California under article 23701G as a domestic non-profit corporation.

Active membership is limited to fifty-five. Officers are elected by the membership at large and serve a one-year term.

At the weekly luncheon meetings, subjects of a broad range of interests are presented by members or guest speakers, as the Record of Programs indicates each year. Partisan politics and denominational religion are prohibited subjects.

Members or guest speakers addressing the Forum are otherwise unrestricted in the expression of their views. With the speaker's consent, a short period at the end of each program is customarily devoted to questions or comments from the Forum members.

Guests of members are always welcome, except at meetings restricted to the discussion of Forum affairs.
