Presenter: Sandy Barbour, Athletic Director University of California, Berkeley

Topic: "The World According to Oski"

What a world it is for the student-athletes at UC Berkeley! With Cal's history of comprehensive excellence in athletics, we will be privileged to get an inside view from its dynamic and enthusiastic Athletic Director. Sandy Barbour oversees a 27-sport program with more than 800 student-athletes.

She will address Berkeley's perspective on intercollegiate athletics, including the value college sports brings to the campus, historical performance, and some of Cal's distinctive traditions. She will also discuss national trends, including conference expansion, and their impact on UC Berkeley.

Sandy Barbour had major athletic management responsibilities at Tulane and Northwestern and a term as Deputy Director of Athletics at Notre Dame before assuming her current position at Cal six years ago. Her accomplishments at Cal have included recognition as Regional Athletic Director of the Year, for 2008-09, by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics.

Her college athletic career started at Wake Forest where she was a four-year letter winner and served as captain of the field hockey team. She has earned advanced degrees at both Massachusetts (an M.S. in sports management) and Northwestern's Kellogg School of Management (an MBA).

The Big Sir Says . . .

And the Next Speakers Are... - Over the six years since I joined Branch 35, I have heard many members repeatedly praise our speakers who, month in and month out, I think you would agree, rate overall somewhere between very good and outstanding. But how in the world do we consistently come up with speakers of this quality when we pay them nothing? Well, it isn't nearly as difficult as you might think.

Each year we form an ad hoc Speakers Committee of ten or so members from a variety of backgrounds and meet once in the Fall for a couple of hours, led by the Little Sir who will become Big Sir the following year. We brainstorm all of the important and/or interesting topics facing the world (e.g. global warming), the nation (e.g. the presidential election), the state (e.g. the budget process, immigration), and the Bay Area (e.g. the new 49er stadium). I have given mostly political topics as examples, but we also cover many other fields including sports, entertainment, history, nostalgia, the military, education, medicine, and technology to name a few. Then we ask ourselves who might be able to speak on those topics and how could we contact them most effectively. By the end of this once-a-year meeting we have a long list of potential speakers along with designated members of the branch who would be best able to reach out to our targeted speakers.

Another source for speaker ideas is an informal group of Little Sirs and Program Chairmen from about twenty SIR branches in Santa Clara County, including Branch 35, who meet for breakfast three times a year to swap ideas for speakers. Information (including a 1 to 10 rating!) on speakers who have appeared at all the nearby branches over the past five years has been collected by this Speakers Bureau for use by the branches in their program planning.

A final source of speaker ideas is members like you who have heard of or listened to an outstanding speaker and have passed the idea along to the Little Sir. With these three sources of speakers, we complete the following year's speaker calendar before the end of the current year, most often with more speaker options than we can accommodate.

And the Nominees Are... - On another topic, the Branch 35 that we all enjoy depends on the work of a large number of volunteers in a variety of roles. One of these roles is the administrative leadership of the branch. Those important responsibilities are vested in the Executive Committee,

We will hike about 7.4 miles (round trip) with an elevation gain of 600 feet. We begin the hike on the Coastal Trail with a vista of Stinson Beach and the ocean after 2 miles. We then proceed to the Laurel Dell picnic area and the Cataract Falls for our lunch. The return hike follows Cataract and Old Mine Trails back to the parking lot with a great view of the Marin Headlands.

Go north on Highway 101 past Sausalito to the Highway 1 exit. Drive about 3.3 miles on Highway 1; then make a right turn onto the Panoramic Highway. Drive 4.9 miles on the Panoramic Highway to the Pantoll Trailhead (on your left). Driving time will be about 90 minutes. Note: \$6 Golden Gate Bridge toll on the return trip.

NEW RIDE! Half Moon Bay/Pillar Point

We will ride the paved flat trail along the ocean shore for about 6.5 miles from Poplar Beach, located south of Half Moon Bay, to Pillar Point, just past the town of Princeton. We will return to Princeton where we will have lunch, then ride the same trail back for a total of about 13 miles. **Note:** This replaces the Shoreline Park ride previously scheduled for this date.

Take I-280 north (approximately 15 miles) to Highway 92, then take the exit to Half Moon Bay. Continue on Highway 92 about 10 miles to the intersection with Highway 1, turn left. Go about one mile to Poplar St., turn right. At the end of Poplar St., park in the Poplar Beach parking lot, near the port-a-johns. Driving time is about 45 minutes. It may be windy and cold; so be sure to bring a windbreaker and gloves. Or, it may be a lovely sunny day!
