PROGRAM

<u>Speaker</u> – Theo Palmer, PhD, Associate Professor, Neurosurgery, Stanford Institute for Stem Cell Biology and Regenerative Medicine.

<u>Topic</u> - Parkinson's Disease in a Petri Dish: Using Stem Cells to Understand and Treat Neurological Disease.

Recent advances in stem cell research now allow scientists to reprogram skin cells to become nerve cells. When isolated from a patient with neurodegenerative disease, these nerve cells faithfully reproduce key features of the disease. Dr. Palmer will describe the emerging technologies that are used to understand and treat Parkinson's disease.



Dr. Palmer's translational research investigates the role of stem cells in the normal and diseased brain. He uses several stem cell models, including embryonic, fetal, and adult brain stem cells. Stem cells in the brain, *i.e.* neural stem cells, produce new nerve

cells throughout adult life. However, this process of neurogenesis is limited to specific regions; it does not repair large injuries nor keep pace with serious degenerative diseases, such as Parkinson's or Alzheimer's disease. Dr. Palmer is studying the molecules that control neural stem cell activity to determine if they might be used to improve the brain's intrinsic ability for self repair. He aims to find interventions that would promote the production of replacement nerve cells, so that stem cells can be used to augment or repair an injured or diseased nervous system. The ultimate goal of Dr. Palmer's work is extrapolate findings from the Petri dish into mice, primates, and then humans, resulting in well-validated and safe stem cell therapies that ameliorate the devastating effects of disease or injury.

Dr. Palmer received his PhD from the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center at the University of Washington in Seattle. He did his post-doctoral work at the Salk Institute in La Jolla, CA. He joined the faculty at Stanford in 2000.

Results of the July Picnic/BBQ: On a perfect day for such an event, 208 members and guests gathered at our meeting site to enjoy an outstanding picnic. First-Half-Year Reports: By July 1, we added 33 new active members to our branch. That raises our current total membership to 392, which approaches our historic high of 398 in May, 1991. At the current rate of membership increase, we should exceed our goal of 35 additions for the year. Our guest attendance this year to date has been 40. This has been achieved owing to the diligent efforts of our members and the leadership of our Membership Director, Arden Anderson, supported by his Assistant, Bill Hall.

On the financial side, careful control of costs and close matching between luncheon revenue and costs each month have enabled the branch to keep its General Account Reserve Fund nearly equal to that at the end of last year. Car Pooling/Park & Ride: Last month in this column I outlined our need for increased car pooling and the benefits of doing it. While we will work with the new tenant of the smaller hall connected to ours (Hall #2) to seek a change in their use time on site so as to avoid the need for additional parking spaces, we still must increase both car pooling and park & ride alternatives in order to accommodate membership growth and convenience. Under the leadership of our Webmaster, Skip Ross, good progress has been made toward providing participating members with a Google map of all nearby members to their residences to help in forming car pools. Further, a park & ride concept is in the process of preparation so members can meet at three suggested peninsula locations (north, central and south), park their cars and ride with a driver to and from the meeting. More news on these tools will be provided in the coming months.

Ride - Mountain View to Alviso (New Ride). We will begin the ride at the La Avenida Trailhead and follow the Stevens Creek Trail for 1.5 miles to where it connects with the Bay Trail. We will continue the ride 3.5 miles on the levees and old service roads as we cross the waters north of Moffett Field. (Note: This portion of the Bay Trail has a packed gravel surface and is a little bumpy in places) We will then head for Sunnyvale Baylands Park. We will follow the trail through the park and then on to downtown Alviso, where we will have lunch at a restaurant. The ride is 9.5 miles one way. We will return on the same route for a round-trip of 19 miles. There are no optional shortcuts.

<u>Directions</u> - Meet at the La Avenida Trailhead at end of La Avenida Ave. To get there from the intersection of Hwy 101 and Shoreline Blvd. then head north on Shoreline Blvd. toward the Computer Museum. La Avenida is the first street on the right but it is a oneway street there so you must go past the Computer Museum to Pear Ave. and then turn right. Turn right again on the next street which is Ingo Way. Then turn left on La Avenida. (It is a two-way street there). Go four blocks to the end of the street and park on the street, next to the curb.

<u>Location</u> - Big Basin State Park, Santa Cruz County. Meet in the main parking lot inside the park.

<u>Driving Directions</u> - Take Highway 9 (Big Basin Way) from the town of Saratoga up to Skyline at Saratoga Gap and then 6 more miles to Highway 236. Take Highway 236 about 12 miles to the Park Headquarters (Caution, this last 12 miles is a narrow and winding road.) Parking is on your right as you reach the Headquarters building, just beyond the kiosk. Driving time will be about 60 minutes from your house.

<u>Hike</u> - We will hike 7.0 miles (round trip) with an elevation gain of 600 feet. The trails are in the redwoods and we will hike along Opal and Blooms Creeks. Also. we will stop at the Sempervirens Falls on our return to Park Headquarters. This should be a cool and shady hike for August. Bathrooms are available at the trailhead.

Lunch - Bring a lunch or snack and water.
